*Besides all this, she was kindness and gentleness itself. I am sorry for this heavy loss. May her name bwe always for a blessing.*

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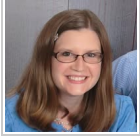

“ I just learned of Suzette’s death. I took courses from Suzette in the 1970s when she was at University of Virginia. Women in Literature, Virginia Woolf, whatever I could. She was a magnificent teacher. All of a sudden she was gone from. Va. (I learned the details of that story later) and it was literally decades before I could track her down and later still when I encountered her in Knoxville at the NEXUS Conference in 2010 “Trauma and Testimony.” I was able see her many, many times after that, luckily. “ Suzette had been a mentor of mine since 2000. At that time, I was a freshman who had not declared a major. Suzette encouraged me to pursue a degree in English, and since then she had always endeavored to assist me in the advancement of my academic and professional career.

*I worked as Suzette's research assistant for a number of years, during which time I gained invaluable experience. Suzette encouraged my own interest and experience in archival research by obtaining permission for me to examine the holograph manuscript of Virginia Woolf's "Prime Minister" in the Berg Collection of the New York Public Library. I used this experience to assist her in transcribing the manuscript for Bonnie Kime Scott's Gender in Modernism. The experience informed both my senior honors thesis and my dissertation.*

*I applied for the Humanities doctoral program at the University of Louisville based on Suzette's recommendation. I believe it was due to her influence that I was granted a fellowship, which allowed me to devote my time to my studies and finish the program ahead of schedule. Suzette was the chair of my dissertation committee, and two of the chapters from my dissertation (which was later published as a book) were based on work that I did in her classes.*

*Suzette was always very supportive of me, both personally and academically. Furthermore, as I took four classes with her over the years, I can attest to how nurturing she was generally with her students. Suzette had a long career of mentoring students, many of whom went on to become published authors and scholars.*

*Suzette also set up a study abroad program because she recognized how enriching international study is for students. She led several courses overseas, including two that I participated in—one as a freshman and one as a graduate student. I can attest to how such travel not only deepened my understanding of the course material, but expanded my mind by exposing me to different*

*cultures. By setting up a study abroad program, Suzette hoped to impact students for years to come.*

*Suzette was a wonder teacher, mentor, scholar, and friend. Many of the formative experiences of my life were due to her, and I will be forever grateful to her.*

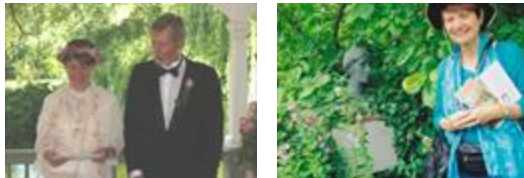
